Maryam Al-Khawaja is the Head of the Foreign Relations Office for the Bahrain Center for Human Rights. Ms. Al-Khawaja returned to Bahrain when she was 14 after her family had sought refuge in Denmark for 12 years. She then became an active member of the Bahraini youth movement. She is a former leader of "Association Internationale des Étudiants en Sciences Économiques et Commerciales-Bahrain" (AIESEC-Bahrain) and assisted with efforts to bridge the gap among Shi'a and Sunni Bahraini youth. AIESEC is the world's largest student organization and acts as the international platform for young people to discover and develop their potential so as to have a positive impact on society. Ms. Al-Khawaja is a 2006 Georgetown University Middle East Partnership Initiative Alumna. She has testified previously before the Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission in 2008 regarding political reform and religious freedom in Bahrain.
