



**Artak Beglaryan** held several senior responsibilities in the Republic of Artsakh (Nagorno-Karabakh), including from 2021-2022 the State Minister of the Republic of Artsakh, and from 2018-2020 the Human Rights Ombudsman of the Republic. Currently, he serves as the president of the “Artsakh Union,” an advocacy non-governmental organization. His work focuses on raising global awareness about the genocide in Artsakh and advocating for international justice and protection for his compatriots sheltered in Armenia.



**Jared Genser** is an international human rights lawyer and serves as counsel to Ruben Vardanyan, who is a former State Counselor of the Republic of Nagorno-Karabakh and one of the Armenian Christian political prisoners detained in Azerbaijan. Genser is Managing Director of Perseus Strategies, a public interest law firm, and Lecturer in Law at Stanford Law School. Referred to by the *New York Times* as “The Extractor” for his work freeing political prisoners worldwide, he has served as pro bono counsel to five Nobel Peace Prize Laureates. Genser was previously a partner in the government affairs practice of DLA Piper LLP. He is author of *The UN Working Group on Arbitrary Detention: Commentary and Guide to Practice* (Cambridge University Press). He holds a B.S. from Cornell

University, an M.P.P. from Harvard University, and a J.D. from the University of Michigan.



**Miriam Lanskoj** is Senior Director for Russia and Eurasia at the National Endowment for Democracy. In 2003 she was awarded a PhD in international affairs from Boston University. She has twenty years of experience in political analysis and democracy promotion in Russia and Eurasia. She has been a term member in the Council on Foreign Relations, published numerous articles in academic journals, and testified in Congress, and appeared on the PBS Newshour. In 2010, Dr. Lanskoj co-authored *[The Chechen Struggle: Independence Won and Lost](#)*. Called “balanced, honest and courageous” by Zbigniew Brzezinski, the book is a uniquely candid, inside account of Chechnya’s two wars against Russia and its interwar attempt to establish national institutions.
